Baptisms are customarily performed on Sunday at 2:30 P.M. Prior arrangements with the parish priest or deacon must be made as far in advance as possible. The Godfather and Godmother should be practicing Catholics. Our Baptismal Program meets at 7:30 P.M. on the second Monday of each month in the Parish Center.

### WE CELEBRATE PENANCE:

Confessions are heard on Saturdays from 4:00 - 4:45 PM. A more convenient time may be arranged with the parish priest by calling the Parish Center.

In order to prepare adequately for the life-long commitment to the Sacrament and to arrange to participate in a Marriage Preparation Program, we ask that you make arrangements with the priest or deacon of your choice at least six months prior to the date of the marriage. Because of the Sunday Mass schedule, Nuptial Masses are normally celebrated on Friday evening or Saturday. Weddings should take place in the proper parish of the bride or groom.

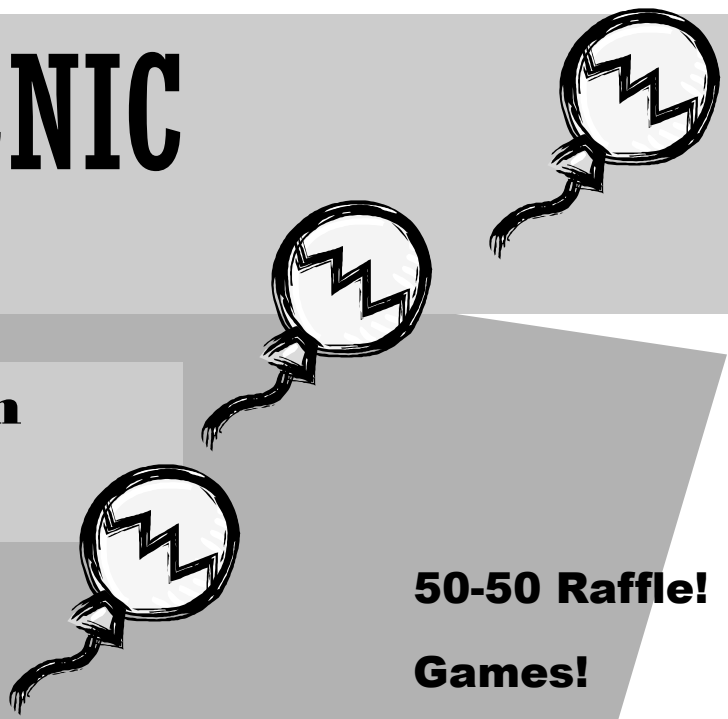

## FEAST OF FAITH

### The Shape of the Eucharistic Prayer

Our Eucharistic Prayers originated in the traditional Jewish meal prayers known as *berakah*, which were prayers of thanksgiving used at meals. Over the centuries, the Christian thanksgiving, or Eucharist, gradually took shape. While in the East the Eucharistic Prayers (called *anaphora*) took many forms, in the Roman Church there was for many centuries just one Eucharistic Prayer, called the Roman Canon (now known as Eucharistic Prayer I). Almost all Eucharistic Prayers include the same basic elements. They begin with thanksgiving and acclamation. Then there is an *epiclesis*, as the priest calls down the Holy Spirit upon the gifts. Then follows the institution narrative and consecration, as the words that Jesus spoke at the Last Supper are repeated. After the consecration, we remember in an explicit way all that Christ has done for us—this is the *anamnesis*, or remembering. The prayer concludes with the offering, the intercessions—prayers for the Church, our leaders, ourselves—and a final doxology of praise.

The reforms of the Second Vatican Council enriched our liturgy with additional Eucharistic Prayers, including both ancient texts (Eucharistic Prayer II is based on the most ancient of all existing Eucharistic Prayers) and new compositions.

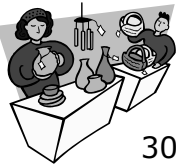

## **PREPARING FOR THE NEW TRANSLATION OF THE MASS**

### **The Introductory Rites**

On the First Sunday of Advent, November 27, 2011, Catholic parishes in the United States will begin praying the texts of the Mass using a new English translation of *The Roman Missal*. This week, we explore the Introductory Rites of the Mass.

Every time we gather for Eucharist, each of us comes with our own preoccupations and concerns. The Introductory Rites of the Mass are intended to draw us out of our own little worlds and form us into an assembly of God's people, the Body of Christ, ready to render our praise and thanksgiving to God. Each element is designed to play its own role in uniting us as a worshipping people and calling us into God's presence. We hear each other's voices in the opening song and the Glory to God; we remember who we are as God's people through the Sign of the Cross, the Greeting, and the Penitential Act; and we prepare ourselves for today's particular celebration in the opening prayer or Collect. If we allow the Introductory Rites to do their work, we will be ready to celebrate the Eucharist as one people in God.

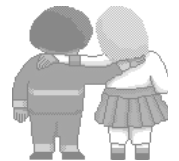

## Prayers and history of the Church



August 14, 2011  
20th Sunday in Ordinary Time

August 14, 2011

Today we remember Saint Maximilian Kolbe, a Polish priest who is honored by the church for the brave and generous way he died.

Father Kolbe opened centers in Poland and Japan where he published religious newspapers and pamphlets. Many young priests joined his work. In 1941 he was arrested with other Polish leaders who would not support Nazi rule. He was sent to the Auschwitz prison camp, and endured cruel treatment there. He comforted other prisoners, and often gave his meager food away. When ten men were chosen for execution, Father Kolbe asked to take the place of one who had a wife and children. On August 14, Father Kolbe was executed.

**Reading** Isaiah 65:18-20, 21-22

**Listen to the words of the prophet Isaiah.**

The Lord says this:

Celebrate and be glad forever!

I am creating Jerusalem full of happy people.

I will celebrate with Jerusalem and all of its people;

There will be no more crying  
or sorrow in that city.

No child will die in infancy; everyone will live to a ripe old age.

My people will live  
in the houses they build;

They will enjoy grapes  
from their own vineyards.

No one will take away  
their homes or vineyards.

**Reflection:** Why would victims of persecution be comforted by Isaiah's vision of heaven? Why do Christians pray, "thy Kingdom come, thy will be done on earth"? What can I do to help build God's kingdom?

Today we celebrate the Assumption of Mary, body and soul, into heaven. According to ancient tradition, Mary lived in the town of Ephesus (*EF-uh-sus*) after the ascension of Jesus. When she was dying, John who was by then Bishop of Ephesus, sent word to the other apostles, who hurried to her bedside. But Thomas did not arrive until after her funeral. On opening the tomb so he could pay his respects, they were amazed to find lilies in place of the body of their "mother" and friend.

Christians keep this day as a harvest festival. Mary has been harvested into God's kingdom, and the earth's season of plenty has begun. Arrange fruits, vegetables and flowers on your table or around an image of Mary. Bless the garden or visit a pick-your-own farm.
