WE CELEBRATE BAPTISM:

Baptisms are customarily performed on Sunday at 2:30 P.M. Prior arrangements with the parish priest or deacon must be made as far in advance as possible. The Godfather and Godmother should be practicing Catholics. Our Baptismal Program meets at 7:30 P.M. on the second Monday of each month in the Parish Center.

WE CELEBRATE PENANCE:

Confessions are heard on Saturdays from 4:00 - 4:45 PM. A more convenient time may be arranged with the parish priest by calling the Parish Center.

WE CELEBRATE MARRIAGE:

In order to prepare adequately for the life-long commitment to the Sacrament and to arrange to participate in a Marriage Preparation Program, we ask that you make arrangements with the priest or deacon of your choice at least six months prior to the date of the marriage. Because of the Sunday Mass schedule, Nuptial Masses are normally celebrated on Friday evening or Saturday. Weddings should take place in the proper parish of the bride or groom.

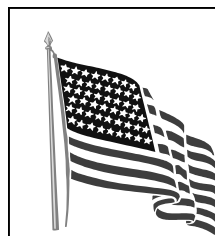
FEAST OF FAITH

Remembering

When Jesus broke the bread on the night before he died, he told his disciples, "do this in memory of me" (Luke 22:19). Christians have been faithful to that solemn command. Our eucharistic remembering is not nostalgia, nor is it merely historical, recalling events and facts of long ago. In the liturgy, remembering is action. "Do this," Jesus said. In the Eucharist, we remember by doing. And as we remember, the sacrifice of Jesus is renewed, truly made present, no longer then, but now.

After the consecration, each of the Eucharistic Prayers includes a section called the *anamnesis*, a Greek word that means "remembering." In this part of the prayer, "the Church, fulfilling the command that she received from Christ the Lord through the Apostles, keeps the memorial of Christ, recalling especially his blessed Passion, glorious Resurrection, and Ascension into heaven" (*General Instruction of the Roman Missal*, 79e). We pause and call to mind the whole paschal mystery, Christ's dying and rising. "We celebrate the memory of his death and resurrection" (*Eucharistic Prayer for Reconciliation II*). Obeying Christ's command, we remember.

OUR LADY OF THE HAMPTONS

This summer has been very exciting as construction for the new wellness center-classroom extension has been moving along. The foundation is now in process, with steel expected in mid-September. This project will provide four additional classrooms as well as a full gymnasium with suspended running track. The first stages of the project have been funded totally by foundation grants, family and local fund-raising efforts.

The school community of OLH is actively seeking additional donors and sponsors for the Wellness Center—Classroom extension. The completion of the building, expected in late spring 2012, will depend upon the ability of the school to raise an additional \$700,000 over the coming months. There are several memorial opportunities available in this gymnasium-four classroom extension. There are brochures available at the doors of the church. Anyone wishing to make a donation toward this effort is asked to contact the school at 283-9140.

The new school year will begin on Wednesday, September 7, when OLH welcomes its largest student body of 360 students for orientation. The year will begin officially with the opening school liturgy on Friday, September 9 at 10 AM at Our Lady of Poland Church.

Pre-school is the time when 3 & 4 year olds begin the solid foundation of their elementary education. Our Lady of the Hamptons hosts a fully licensed program taught by certified professional teachers at St. Rosalie's Parish Center in Hampton Bays. There is still room in both the morning and afternoon sessions. Please contact the school 283-9140 for a brochure and information leading to registration.

PREPARING FOR THE NEW TRANSLATION OF THE MASS

Communion and the Concluding Rites

On the First Sunday of Advent, November 27, 2011, Catholic parishes in the United States will begin praying the texts of the Mass using a new English translation of *The Roman Missal*. This week, we explore Communion and the Concluding Rites.

Our great prayer of praise and thanksgiving leads through the Lord's Prayer, our petition for daily bread, into the action of Communion. We sing together even as we rise and move forward in procession to the altar. We must move to receive Communion because the Eucharist is transformative—it demands action of us, internal as well as external. We do not receive the sacrament in silence, but with a dialogue that is a profession of faith: "The Body of Christ." "Amen." "The Blood of Christ." "Amen." Our "Amen" is also a prayer that we may become what we receive, the Body of Christ, living and active in the world. So it makes sense that after Communion we are dismissed—not just let out, but sent forth with a mission "to announce the gospel of the Lord." This leave-taking is joined to a blessing, a prayer for God's continuing protection as we go out on our way.

Lord, help us to increase in wisdom.

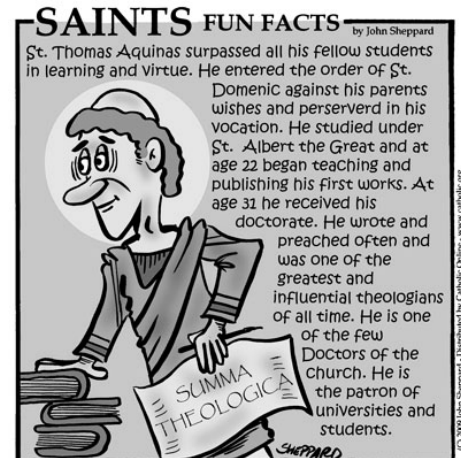
When we feel lost and alone, let us remember that we will always find Jesus in his Father's house, we pray to the Lord.

St. Rose of Viterbo, September 4th

Rose was born in Viterbo, in Italy. During that time Emperor Frederick had conquered land that belonged to the Church. Rose's special mission as a teenager was to make the people of her own city and nearby cities remain faithful to the Holy Father the Pope. And this she did very well. In fact, when she was eight years old, Rose was quite sick and our Blessed Mother appeared to her and told her that she should wear the habit (uniform) of St. Francis. Our Lady also told Rose to set a good example by her words and actions. Slowly Rose became strong and healthy again. She began to think more and more about how much Jesus suffered for us and how much we had hurt him because of our sins. She prayed and made sacrifices to show Jesus how much she loved him.



Later on, this brave girl began to preach in the streets of the city. She told people not to agree the emperor who had taken land from the Church.

So many people listened to her advice that Rose's father became frightened. He told her he would beat her if she did not stop preaching. She was only thirteen years old, but she answered gently, "If Jesus was willing to be beaten for me, I can be beaten for him. I must do what Jesus has told me to do, and I will not disobey him."

For two more years Rose preached with such success that the enemies of the pope wanted to kill her. In the end, the emperor sent Rose and her parents out of the city. But Rose said that the emperor was going to die soon and that is exactly what happened. When they returned to Viterbo, Rose was not allowed to become a nun, so she returned to her own home. There she died in 1252, when she was only seventeen. Even today, her body is preserved and venerated in Viterbo
