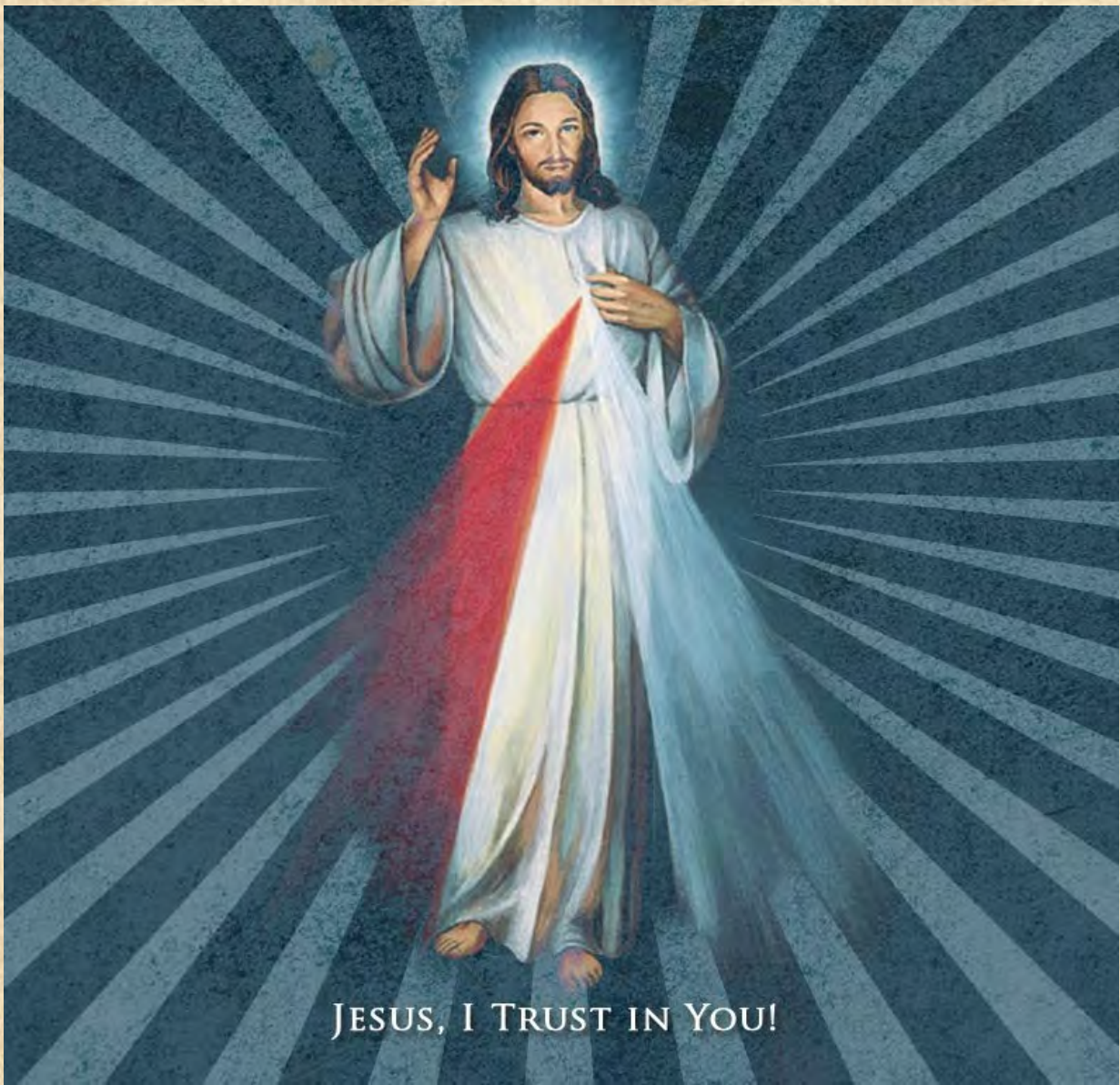

Pastor's Letter

April 26/27
Divine Mercy Sunday

The Mercy of God Is Full of Compassion

Dear Parish Family,

As you are celebrating Divine Mercy Sunday, I will be travelling with 19 members of our parish on a pilgrimage to Lourdes. We will also be visiting Lisieux, the birthplace of St. Therese, and Paray-le-Monial, where the Sacred Heart appeared to St. Margaret Mary Alacoque. Today is also the day on which Pope John Paul II and John XXIII will be canonized. John Paul II had a special devotion to Jesus under the title of Divine Mercy and it was he who named the Sunday after Easter, Divine Mercy Sunday. So there are a number of connections which come together on this weekend!

Images like the Sacred Heart or Divine Mercy are part of our faith in Jesus and these titles tell us something about the quality or nature of God's love for us. Pope John Paul II often saw the modern world as a place that could be heartless or merciless in the way people treated others. In the modern world, blessings like wealth or technology could be used not at the service of one another but as instruments of competition and domination. In a world of many blessings, the poorest and neediest can often be left out of the picture. But not out of God's picture!

St. Margaret Mary imagined God's stand toward the world as a heart full of love. The image of Divine Mercy and prayers for Divine Mercy imagine Jesus healing the world through a tender and compassionate forgiveness. I have a good friend who is a counselor and spends most of his days dealing with people who are in a great deal of emotional and spiritual pain. It is draining work but he often finds strength for himself by imagining that his patients are not alone but being embraced by a great heart of love that is giving them the strength to be healed. He was delighted to hear that my parish is called Sacred Hearts and is devoted to that wonderful great heart that he often imagines.

You will notice that I have made a number of references to how we imagine things. I use the word imagine to refer to the deliberate choices we make in how to think about things around us. It is a choice in faith to think of the world as a place of coldness and emptiness or to think of it as a place that is embraced, even in its coldness, by a great heart of love. It is a choice to think of God's stance toward us as being an icy judge, or, as this week's feast suggests, Divine Mercy.

Perhaps this is why Pope Francis, in an interview last fall, spoke of the call to the church to be and become a big heart open to God. On this Divine Mercy Sunday let us recognize that the mercy of God is full of compassion. And let us resolve to share with each other God's own mercy to us.

Reflections On the Gospel from Pax Christi April 27, 2014

Today's readings speak of community. In the Gospel, we hear about the companions of Jesus who were locked away out of fear, likely offering each other some sense of support and comfort. In Acts, we hear about a later community who are neither locked away nor fearful. They go to temple together and visit each other's homes to break bread together. They share what they have and care for those in need. In different ways, both communities are there for each other. Jesus may have to reassure the first one before they have the confidence to step into the world, but their ultimate faith empowers them as it does the second community. To what degree are we such communities of faith? To what degree are we there for each other? To what degree do we risk our safety and give generously and joyfully? Is there room for us to grow? Will we?

Faith in the Church Today :: Monday, May 12, at 7:00 PM
The Holy Spirit and the Life of the Church
With Fr. Mike Vetrano

There can be no doubt that the Catholic church is a human institution! Our history is filled with wonderful moments of greatness and saintliness and also with awful moments of sinfulness and failure. Some have said that the surest sign that the church is guided by the Spirit is that it has survived its human character for these 2000+ years. Our talk tonight will explore how Catholic faith in the Holy Spirit begins with the death and resurrection of Jesus. It was in Jesus' dying and rising that the earliest Christians came to discover that they were guided by God's own spirit. What do these roots have to say to a modern church living now in a very different world from that of the disciples?



This talk is a celebration of Easter and a preparation for Pentecost, so join Father Mike on Monday May 12 in the church for this presentation and discussion.

A History of the Catholic Church : June 9 and June 16
With George Sim Johnston

Over the course of two evenings, we shall look at the history of the Catholic Church, from the Age of the Apostles and Martyrs until Vatican II. To know the history of the Church during these two millennia is virtually to know the history of western Europe (and beyond).

The first evening, we shall look at the Church's founding by Jesus Christ, the early spread of Christianity, the Roman persecutions, Constantine and the Edict of Milan, the theological debates that were resolved at the great ecumenical councils, the collapse of the Roman Empire, the great transitional figure of Saint Augustine, the rise of Islam, the Dark Ages, and the great awakening which began in western Europe at the cusp of the second millennium.

The second evening, we shall begin with the "springtime" of western civilization, the age of the great cathedrals and reforming popes like Gregory VII, the Crusades, the clash between the papacy and the German emperors, the golden age of Scholasticism, Saints Dominic and Francis, the Black Death, the Great Schism, the popes of the Renaissance, the Protestant revolt, the remarkable flowering of sanctity and missionary activity known at the Counter-Reformation, the ages of Louis XIV, the French Revolution and Napoleon, and the Church's remarkable recovery in the 19th century under popes like Pius VII and Leo XIII. We shall end with the Church's engagement with the modern world, which continues to unfold under Pope Francis.

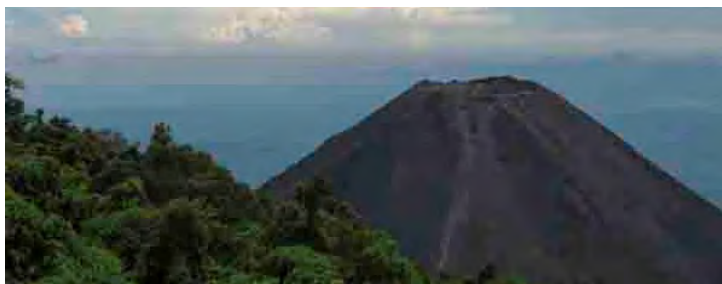


Lourdes Pilgrimage — April 21 to April 30

Alicia Reynoso came to America nine years ago. She was born in Guatemala. Her parents are Eulalio Reynoso and Vicenta Reynoso. Alicia is 29 years old and the mother of two children. La Obligación Pascual - Todos los católicos ya iniciados en la Sagrada Eucaristía tienen la obligación de recibir la Sagrada Comunión por lo menos una vez durante la temporada Pascual: Domingo de Pascua, 19 de abril, hasta Pentecostés, 8 de junio. (En los Estados Unidos, la Obligación Pascual puede cumplirse hasta el domingo de la Santísima Trinidad, 15 de junio). Se exhorta a los católicos a que reciban la Comunión con la frecuencia que les sea posible durante el año litúrgico, no solo durante la temporada pascual. Sin embargo, "Quien tiene conciencia de estar en pecado grave debe recibir el Sacramento de la Reconciliación antes de acercarse a comulgar." (CCE, §1385)

Intenciones del Papa para Abril

Universal: Para que los gobernantes promuevan el cuidado de la creación y la justa distribución de los bienes y recursos naturales.

Por la Evangelización: Para que el Señor Resucitado llene de esperanza el corazón de quienes sufren el dolor y la enfermedad.

El Papa Francisco Hable sobre la Misericordia - El Evangelio proclama: «Felices los *misericordiosos*, porque obtendrán mise-ricordia» (Mt 5,7). El Apóstol Santiago enseña que la *misericordia* con los demás nos permite salir triunfantes en el juicio divino... Santiago se muestra como heredero de lo más rico de la espiritualidad judía del pos exilio, que atribuía a la *misericordia* un especial valor salvífico: «Rompe tus pecados con obras de justicia, y tus iniquidades con *misericordia* para con los pobres, para que tu ventura sea larga» (Dn 4,24). En esta misma línea, la literatura sapiencial habla de la limosna como ejercicio concreto de la *misericordia* con los necesitados: «La limosna libra de la muerte y purifica de todo pecado» (Tb 12,9). 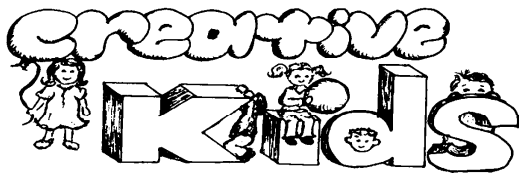
Requisitos para el Bautismo de un Niño

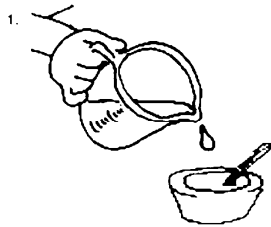

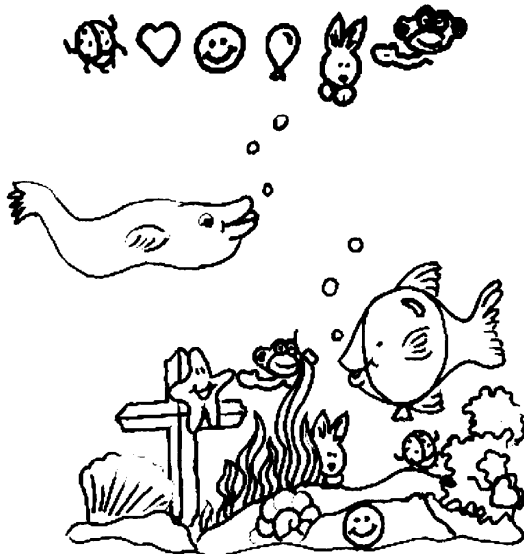
