# Pastor's Letter

## The Adventures of the Disciples

Dear Parish Family,

We often think of the time after Easter as the time of the resurrection. The Gospels we read speak to us of how the disciples came to believe that Jesus was risen. The empty tomb became a sign not of more grief and loss that his body was missing or stolen, but a sign of victory and promise fulfilled. For the disciples, this realization became the motivation for them to begin to spread the message of Jesus on their own. We call this experience the sending of the Spirit. It is also the beginning of the church and of our history as followers of Christ.

One of the last stories in the Gospel of Luke is the story of the disciples on the road to Emmaus. It is a touching story, a story of grief and hope. It is a story that everyone who has lost a loved one can relate to. The disciples are discussing their grief and loss when Jesus, the risen Jesus, begins to walk with them and explain that his death was not loss but fulfillment. It is a physical experience for them. Their hearts burn inside them as he speaks in their hearts. Later, after breaking bread together, they recognize the Lord but he suddenly disappears. Actually he disappears into them. His Spirit fills them and so they no longer need to see in order to believe. Now they need to go and tell others about this encounter. They go out from Jerusalem, the place of his dying and rising, to tell the world this good news. In this moment of mission they become the church.

We often forget that Luke's gospel is really the first of two books. We call the second book the Acts of the Apostles. Luke himself begins this book telling the reason for its writing. In the former book, he says, I told you of all that Jesus said and did until he was taken up into heaven. In this new volume he tells us about what those disciples did when they were filled with his Spirit. I often like to think of this second book as the adventures of the disciples because that is how it reads. The disciples go out into the world, not sure what they should do but knowing that the Spirit will be with them and will let them know what to say and what to do.

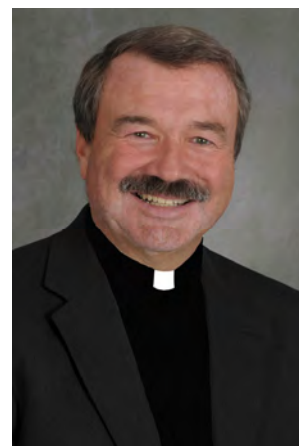
In the Bible, the Acts of the Apostles comes to an end. In our lives it still continues. The church, our church, is a kind of adventure. The writer is God and the actors are all of us. We write the story as we struggle to follow Christ in the world. We deal with age-old problem like the struggle to believe in times of suffering. And we deal with new problems, like how to protect the poor in a global economy or how to use technology not to consume us and distract us but to spread the word of God and its message of peace.

On Monday, May 12, I will be leading a class and discussion on the Holy Spirit and the mission of the church. Please come and join us. Let's think together about the next chapter in our adventure!

**Faith in the Church Today :: Monday, May 12, at 7:00 PM**  
**The Holy Spirit and the Life of the Church**  
**With Fr. Mike Vetrano**

There can be no doubt that the Catholic church is a human institution! Our history is filled with wonderful moments of greatness and saintliness and also with awful moments of sinfulness and failure. Some have said that the surest sign that the church is guided by the Spirit is that it has survived its human character for these 2000+ years. Our talk tonight will explore how Catholic faith in the Holy Spirit begins with the death and resurrection of Jesus. It was in Jesus' dying and rising that the earliest Christians came to discover that they were guided by God's own spirit. What do these roots have to say to a modern church living now in a very different world from that of the disciples?



This talk is a celebration of Easter and a preparation for Pentecost, so join Father Mike on Monday May 12 in the church for this presentation and discussion.

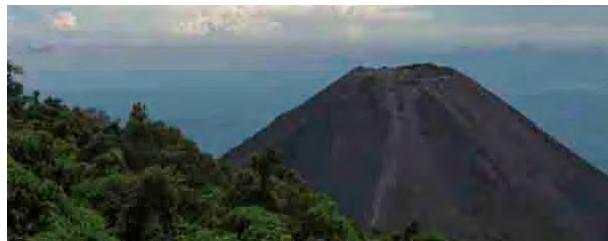
**A History of the Catholic Church : June 9 and June 16**  
**With George Sim Johnston**

Over the course of two evenings, we shall look at the history of the Catholic Church, from the Age of the Apostles and Martyrs until Vatican II. To know the history of the Church during these two millennia is virtually to know the history of western Europe (and beyond).

The first evening, we shall look at the Church's founding by Jesus Christ, the early spread of Christianity, the Roman persecutions, Constantine and the Edict of Milan, the theological debates that were resolved at the great ecumenical councils, the collapse of the Roman Empire, the great transitional figure of Saint Augustine, the rise of Islam, the Dark Ages, and the great awakening which began in western Europe at the cusp of the second millennium.

The second evening, we shall begin with the "springtime" of western civilization, the age of the great cathedrals and reforming popes like Gregory VII, the Crusades, the clash between the papacy and the German emperors, the golden age of Scholasticism, Saints Dominic and Francis, the Black Death, the Great Schism, the popes of the Renaissance, the Protestant revolt, the remarkable flowering of sanctity and missionary activity known at the Counter-Reformation, the ages of Louis XIV, the French Revolution and Napoleon, and the Church's remarkable recovery in the 19<sup>th</sup> century under popes like Pius VII and Leo XIII. We shall end with the Church's engagement with the modern world, which continues to unfold under Pope Francis.

# Youth Ministry Mission Trip 2014 June 28 to July 3

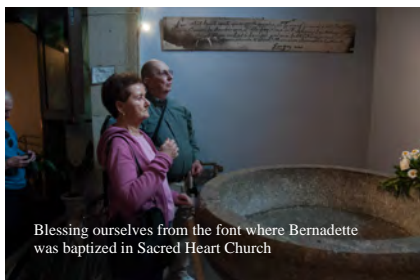

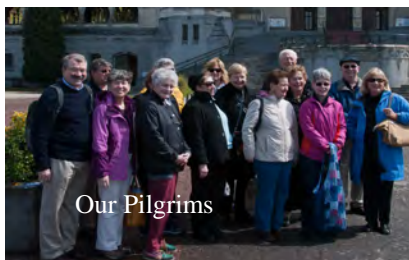

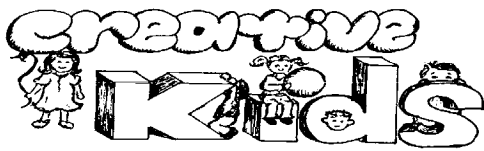
#### Requisitos para el Bautismo de un Niño

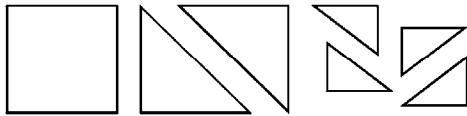

6. Enjoy eating your creations!



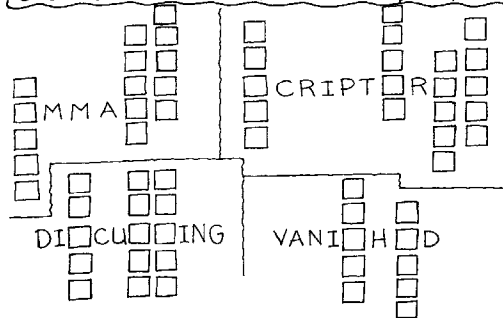

Imagine how wonderful it would be to meet Jesus walking along one of the streets where you live. Like the two people in the Gospel on the road to Emmaus, you could learn so much from listening to Jesus as you traveled with him. Do you wonder why the two disciples didn't recognize Jesus? Sometimes we don't recognize that Jesus is with us today either.

There is a place where you can meet Jesus just as his friends did so long ago. Here are some clues. Can you guess where it is?

- In this place people of all different ages and nationalities gather and recognize Jesus in a special way—just like the two disciples on the road. Did you guess?
- In this place we hear stories about Moses and the prophets and all the scripture stories about Jesus—some of the same stories Jesus shared with his friends. Still guessing?
- In this place we are invited to share a meal—just as Jesus took the bread, said the blessing, broke it, and shared it with his friends. Do you know it yet?
