Dear Parish Family,

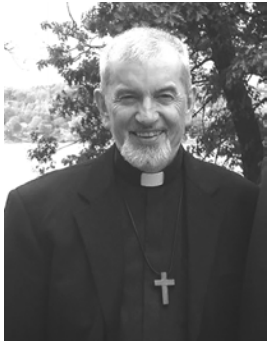

Holy Year of Mercy Jubilee Pilgrimage

Walking the Journey of Peace from Saint Francis to Pope Francis

Join our Pastor, Father Mike, on a pilgrimage to Italy beginning March 29, 2016

Day 1 | Tuesday, March 29: Departure to Venice

Depart the USA by overnight flight to Venice. Meals will be served on board.

Day 2 | Wednesday, March 30: Arrive Venice - transfer to Padua - Mass - sightseeing of Padua overnight Padua (Airport Transfer approx. 40 mins)

Welcome to the incredible city of Venice! Upon arrival, your guide will greet you and you will depart for Padua, where St. Anthony, patron saint of lost things is honored. We celebrate Mass at the Basilica built in his honor.

Following Mass, begin our sightseeing tour including one of the oldest universities in Italy, the Tomb of St. Anthony and we have an opportunity to see several of his relics. We will pass by Pratto Della Valle, and see the Basilica of Santa Giustina. We arrive at our Hotel in time for dinner and a restful overnight.

Day 3 | Thursday, March 31: Full Day Excursion to Venice - Overnight Padua (Transfer to Venice approx. 30 mins, each way)

After breakfast, we depart for nearby Venice, where the streets are paved with water! We will enjoy a tour and visit to some of the greatest sights you will ever see: St. Mark's Square, The Golden Basilica of San Marco, the Bridge of Sighs, and we will even have an extraordinary visit of Doges' Palace.

Day 4 | Friday, April 1: Venice to Florence - early departure - arrive Florence sightseeing pm - Overnight Florence (Padua to Florence approx. 3.2 hours)

After breakfast, we are off to the beautiful town of Florence. We will marvel at its amazing architectural structures and visit the famous Leaning Tower. After lunch, the bus will bring us through the Tuscany until we arrive at our hotel in Florence. You will have a free afternoon to stroll the streets of this city. Enjoy some of the best shopping in Italy, visit a museum, or just relax in a café in the Piazza della Signoria. We gather for dinner to share stories of our day.

Day 5 | Saturday, April 2: Depart Florence to Assisi

After breakfast at our hotel, we'll depart Florence and drive across the Italian countryside to Assisi. We later arrive in Assisi, the hometown of St. Francis, the patron saint of animals and the environment, and the founder of the Franciscan Order. Dinner and overnight in Assisi.

Day 6 | Sunday, April 3: Assisi sightseeing - Overnight Assisi

Today is a very special day, as we will spend a full day touring the home of the Saint that inspired our Holy Father. Pope Francis chose his name in admiration of the Saint of Nature and Servant to the Poor. Known for being a humble man himself, Pope Francis spent most of his life denying the luxuries of life, and preferring to live in simplicity and humility. Following breakfast, we will begin a tour of Assisi. Visit the tomb of St Francis. Explore the quaint hilltop birthplace of St Francis that still retains something of the atmosphere of the early 1200s, the period when St Francis began his ministry. Contained within the huge 13th-century Basilica are many of the saint's possessions and a series of frescoes depicting his life. You may kneel before the crucifix from which Jesus spoke to St Francis, asking him to rebuild His church. It was in St Mary of the Angels Basilica where St Francis spent most of his life. We will visit the tombs of St. Francis and St. Clare before dinner and retiring for the evening.

Day 7 | Monday, April 4: Siena

After breakfast we will head south to Siena, the birthplace of Saints Catherine (Doctor of the Church, and one of the two patron Saints of Italy, with St. Francis of Assisi) and Bernardine (known as the "Apostle of Italy" for his efforts to revive the Catholic faith in the 15th century). Siena is also one of Italy's loveliest medieval cities. Here we will stroll the Piazza Del Campo, one of Italy's finest squares and visit the Cathedral and the Basilica of St. Francis, containing the miraculous consecrated hosts that remained intact since 1730. After lunch, we will continue on to view the incorrupt head of St. Catherine at the Basilica of St. Dominic (Her body is preserved in Rome in the Basilica St. Maria sopra Minerva). We return to Assisi, the hometown of St. Francis, the patron saint of animals and the environment, and the founder of the Franciscan Order. We return to Assisi for dinner and overnight.

Day 8 | Tuesday, April 5: Assisi to Rome (Assisi to Rome approx. 3 hours)

This morning, we will head south and cross through the Roman countryside with its villas and vineyards. Welcome to Rome, one of the most magnificent and interesting cities in the world, also known as the "Eternal City"! We will make our way to Mass, followed by dinner with wine. This evening we will walk to St. Peter's Square for Rosary (optional).

Day 9 | Wednesday, April 6: Rome, Papal Audience, the Holy Staircase, The Basilica of St. Mary Major

Following breakfast, we will make our way to St. Peter's Square to attend the Papal Audience, led by His Holiness, Pope Francis. (Papal Audience: Is scheduled to take place every Wednesday, pending the schedule of Pope Francis.) Following the audience, we will make our way to the Trevi Fountain built in the 15th Century to mark the ending destination of the Aqua Virgo – a man-made channel erected in 19 B.C or Piazza Novona where at the center: Fontana dei Quattro Fiumi "Fountain of the Four Rivers. After free time for lunch we will visit the Basilica of St. John the Lateran, the Pope's cathedral church where relics of both Peter and Paul remain under the main altar. It was here that Pope Francis was formally installed as Bishop of Rome. Next we cross the street to see the Holy Staircase which is believed to be a staircase from Pilate's palace in Jerusalem and brought to Rome by St. Helen in the 4th century. Time permitting we may climb the steps on our knees in memory of Christ's Passion. Continue to the Basilica of St. Mary Major, the most important and the oldest church dedicated to Our Lady. St. Mary Major contains a relic from the manger of the infant Jesus. We will celebrate Mass, and then make our way to dinner and overnight.

Day 10 | Thursday, April 7: Rome, St Peters Basilica, Vatican Museums, Appian Way

Following breakfast, we will depart to celebrate Mass in the largest church in Christendom, St Peter's Basilica, built on the site where St Peter was martyred. Unsurpassed in beauty, a monument to the long history of the Catholic Church, to which pilgrims come from around the world, St Peter's is the grandest of the world's churches. Marvel at the Pieta and Bernini's amazing bronze canopy. Following Mass, we will visit of the Vatican Museums, containing a group of the most impressive edifices with hundreds of galleries filled with art treasures. See awe-inspiring relics, and works of art donated throughout centuries as tributes of faith. We'll cover The Tapestry Gallery, The Raphael Rooms and the most overwhelming Sistine Chapel, Michelangelo's Masterpiece, restored mural of the Last Judgment. The tour ends as we make our way back into St. Peter's Basilica. Pope Francis visited the tomb of St. Peter, following his elevation, for a visit of devotion that lasted 45 minutes. He is the first Pontiff to visit the necropolis since extensive archaeological excavations were conducted at the ancient site decades ago. We will also visit the tomb of St. John Paul II located at the Vatican. There will be free time for lunch, and then we will continue on to visit St Paul outside the Walls. Continue our tour via the Appian Way -- the oldest road from Roman times-- plus the famous Domino Quo Vadis Chapel; see the ancient Baths of Caracalla, Arch of Drusus; Tomb of Celilia Metella, and the catacombs of St Callixtus where the early Christians hid themselves to escape persecution. We will conclude our day and wonderful stay in Rome with dinner at a local restaurant in Rome.

Day 11 | Friday April 8: Depart Rome - Arrive New York

We will bid farewell to our new friends and to a Pilgrimage which will be in our memories and hearts for a long time to come. We depart for Rome's Fiumicino Airport for our return flights home. We fondly say, Arrivederci Italia!

*Did you know... about Bernard Nathanson, MD, abortion proponent turned Pro-Life? Dr. Nathanson was a New York City Obstetrician-Gynecologist who, in the 1960's, ran the largest freestanding abortion clinic in the world, and was a founding member of the National Abortion Rights Action League, or NARAL. He presided over more than 60,000 abortions, doing thousands himself. In the late 1970's, in part because of the availability of improved ultrasound imaging, he began to question the morality of his actions, and completely changed his mind, becoming an outspoken opponent of abortion. He wrote extensively on the subject, including a book titled "The Hand of God: A Journey from Death to Life". In 1996, he converted from Judaism, and became Catholic, being Baptized by John Cardinal O'Connor. He always emphasized that he came to Catholicism **after** he became convinced that abortion was wrong -- not because the Church said so; he was attracted in great part because one could find forgiveness in the Catholic church. Dr. Nathanson died at the age of 84, and was buried from St. Patrick's Cathedral, in New York City.*

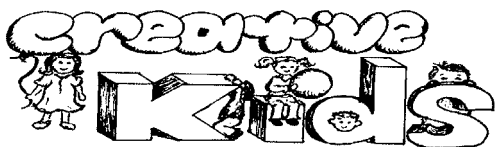
Curso: Para bautizar a su hijo, es necesario que los padres y padrinos asistan al curso pre-bautismal.

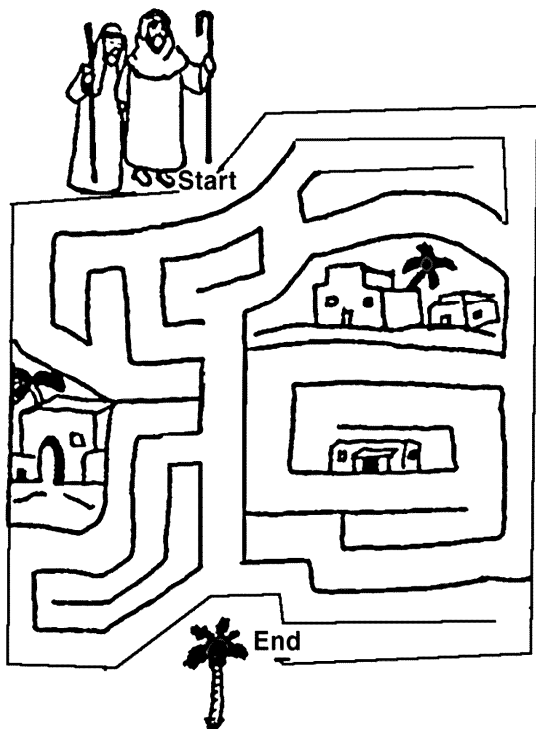
The disciples were missionaries who spread kindness wherever they went. They survived by others showing them kindness with letting them stay in their homes, eat their food and drink their water.
