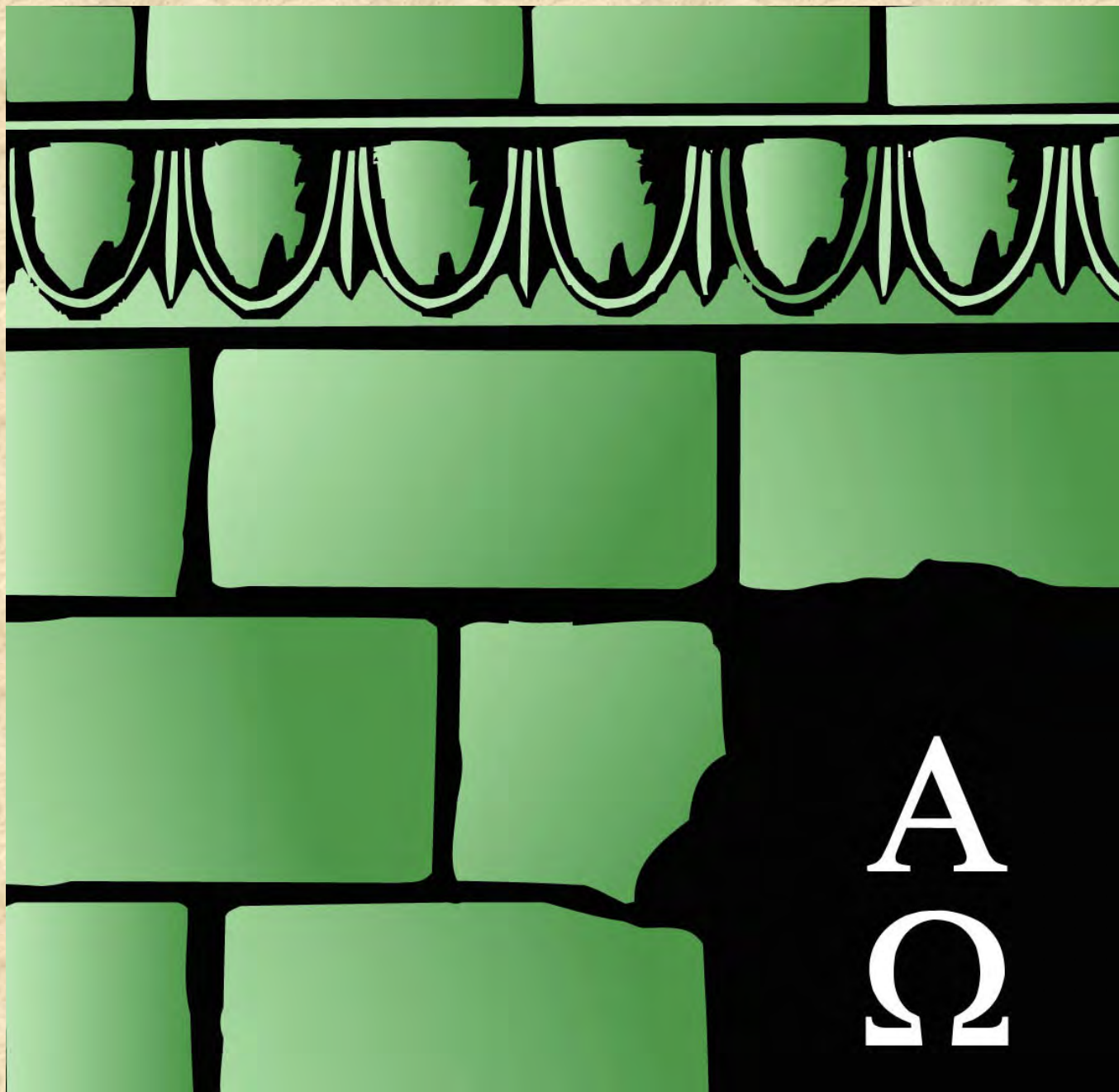

Pastor's Letter

November 12/13

Dear Parish Family,

Suffering, Faith, and Citizenship

What might we expect from the life of faith? In today's gospel Jesus tells his disciples that days of fulfillment lie ahead and that there will be signs on the earth and in the heavens before the day of fulfillment arrives. He also tells his disciples that they might well expect to suffer and to be on trial before the authorities of the world because of what they believe. He also promises that patient endurance will carry them through to the time of fulfillment.

When I was confirmed there was a practice in the church, and I am not sure when it began or when it ended, that after the anointing the bishop would give each of the new confirmandi a slap on the cheek. It was not a violent gesture, just a reminder that we might suffer for what we believe.

For some Christians this suffering has taken the form of martyrdom, literally giving their lives for what they believe. As a young Catholic I was fascinated by stories of saints who were willing to suffer death to bring the gift of faith to others. For most of us, living in this country and in this time, this ultimate sacrifice is unlikely. How then might each of us expect to do what St. Paul calls bearing our share of the suffering of Christ for the sake of the gospel?

Suffering does not necessarily mean being injured. More commonly it means what we bear with or put up with for the sake of what is right. Parents bear many burdens for the sake of their children in ways these young lives will find hard to appreciate. But one day they will bear their own young and put up with the same burdens for their children's good. In every relationship of love we suffer the small irritations and misunderstandings of everyday life for the sake of the greater good of friendship and intimacy.

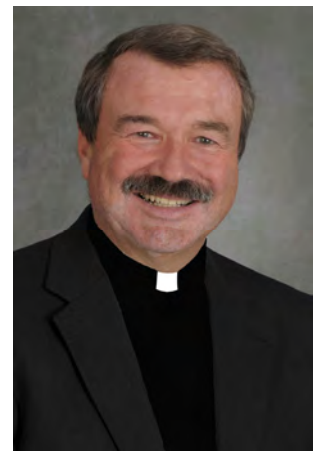
As I write this to you, I think of the suffering of this election year. It is, by the way, Tuesday morning as I send this to print, so I have no idea of the result of the election as you have reading this. In these last months our country has been so divided, so polarized, in a way that is bitter, harsh, and full of resentment. But our nation has known such divisions in the past. It was on a November afternoon in 1863, in the midst of the Civil War, that President Abraham Lincoln in his Gettysburg Address prayed that this nation, under God, shall have a new birth of freedom—and that government of the people, by the people, for the people, shall not perish from the earth.

Christianity can teach us how to bear the sufferings of life. It can teach us how to bear with diversity and disagreement. It can teach us how to maintain our most deeply held values over the things that might divide us. Now more than ever we need the patient endurance of people of faith.

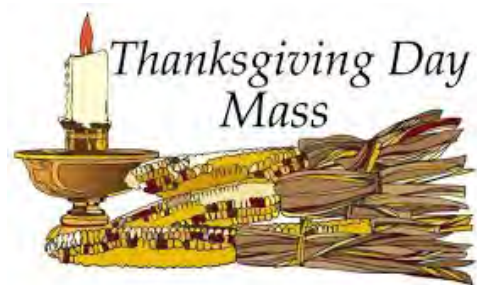

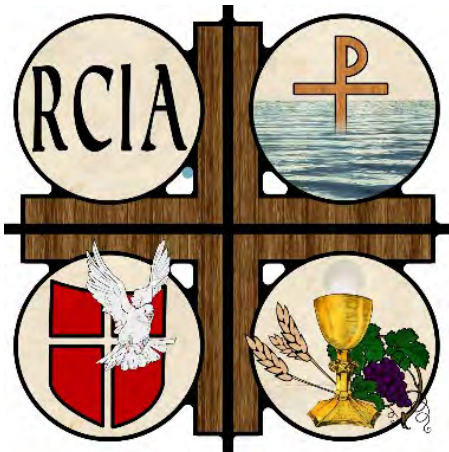

Legion of Mary

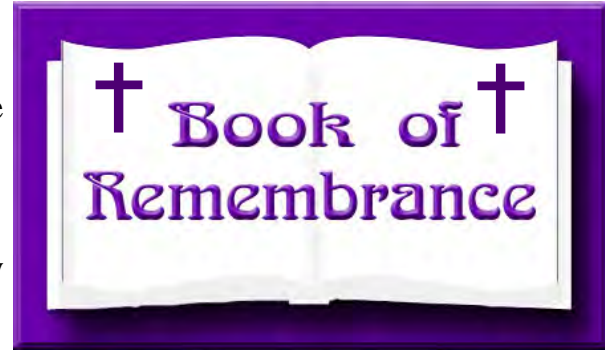

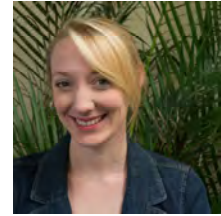

Be A Year Round Friend and Supporter of SHJM

It's that time of year when the days get colder and a time when many many SHJM parishioners have active plans. The migration of summer visitors, people heading to warmer climates for the winter, vacations, and travels all diminish the numbers of those who are able to worship here each week. But please remember that our parish itself is here year round and we never take a break from service and ministry. Last year we began a program of planned, automated giving, called First Fruits. It was a huge success and well over 10% of our supporters participate in this way. It enabled our parish to maintain a more consistent year round income. Automated giving can help insure that our parish remains strongly supported. So here are some ways you can do this:

First Fruits: The easiest, and best if you are technologically challenged is to enroll in First Fruits. All you need to do is give us a void check and fill out a First Fruits Form. You can get one on our website, at the rectory, or at the back of church. First Fruits transfers a contribution either weekly or monthly from your checking account to the church.

Online Bill Pay: Chances are your bank already had a online check writing service called Bill Pay. If you have online access to your checking account you can set it up to write a regular check to SHJM. Just visit your online banking site and set it up for the contribution you desire. Remember to include your Envelope Number

Pay Pal: Pay pal is another way you can make regular contributions. Soon it will also be a way that you can contribute using Credit Cards. Check our website and check back here for more information.

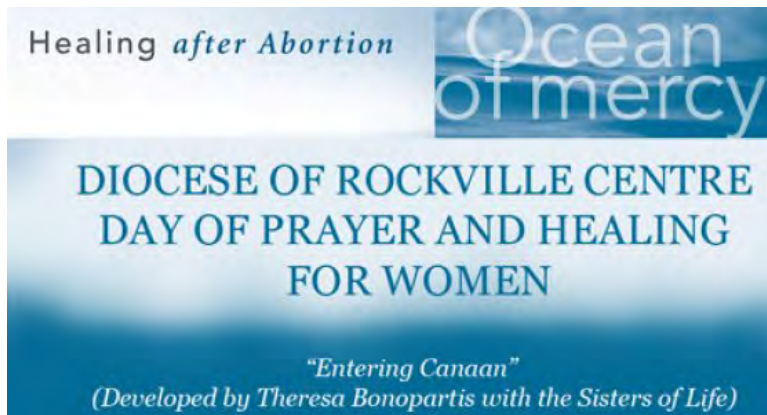

Para Ustedes, los que Temen al Señor, Brillará el Sol de Justicia – Ya que se acerque el fin del año litúrgico de la iglesia, las lecturas en la Misa

nos inviten a reflexionar en el fin del mundo. Unos tienen miedo al pensar que el mundo se va a acabar, pero para los que creen, será la realización de nuestro destino en Dios. El Catecismo de la Iglesia Católica nos enseña:

Al fin de los tiempos el Reino de Dios llegará a su plenitud. Después del Juicio final, los justos reinarán para siempre con Cristo, glorificados en cuerpo y alma, y el mismo universo será renovado: La sagrada Escritura llama "cielos nuevos y tierra nueva" a esta renovación misteriosa que transformará la humanidad y el mundo (2 P 3, 13; cf. Ap 21, 1). Esta será la realización definitiva del designio de Dios de "hacer que todo tenga a Cristo por Cabeza, lo que está en los cielos y lo que está en la tierra" (Ef 1, 10). En este "universo nuevo" (Ap 21, 5), la Jerusalén celestial, Dios tendrá su morada entre los hombres. "Y enjugará toda lágrima de sus ojos, y no habrá ya muerte ni habrá llanto, ni gritos ni fatigas, porque el mundo viejo ha pasado" (Ap 21, 4; cf. 21, 27). (CCE, §1042-1044)

La Segunda Venida de Cristo - Entonces, es cuando Cristo anuncia el juicio que vendrá a juzgar a vivos y muertos, como dice nuestro Credo. Ve la doble perspectiva del evangelio y de las profecías de la Biblia, hechos históricos que nos tocan vivir a nosotros nos deben remontar a la meta de la historia, a la muerte de cada uno de nosotros, al final de nuestra existencia. Esto se llama la escatología, y esa espera del día del Señor la teología lo llama la Parusía: la esperanza de la segunda venida de Cristo.

Volverá Cristo. Esta es la dificultad del cristianismo, vivir entre las dos venidas de Cristo: vino humilde, hecho niño para sufrir, para salvar al mundo; resucitó y ahora vive presente en su Iglesia, pero de una forma invisible. Esta Iglesia, como la esposa que tiene lejos a su esposo, suspira por él. La Iglesia vive esta esperanza. Lo van a decir ustedes, voz de la Iglesia, cuando yo levante la hostia, que es Cristo todavía oculto, y les diga: "Este es el misterio de nuestra fe", nuestra esperanza, este Cristo que les enseñó y que no lo vemos. Entonces el pueblo grita como la esposa enamorada: "Anunciamos tu muerte, proclamamos tu resurrección -es decir, vives- ven, Señor Jesús". *Tomado de la Homilía de Mons. 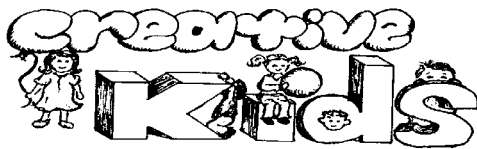
Permisos: Si viven afuera de la zona servida por el Apostolado Hispano, necesitan una carta de su párroco dándonos permiso para bautizar su hijo.

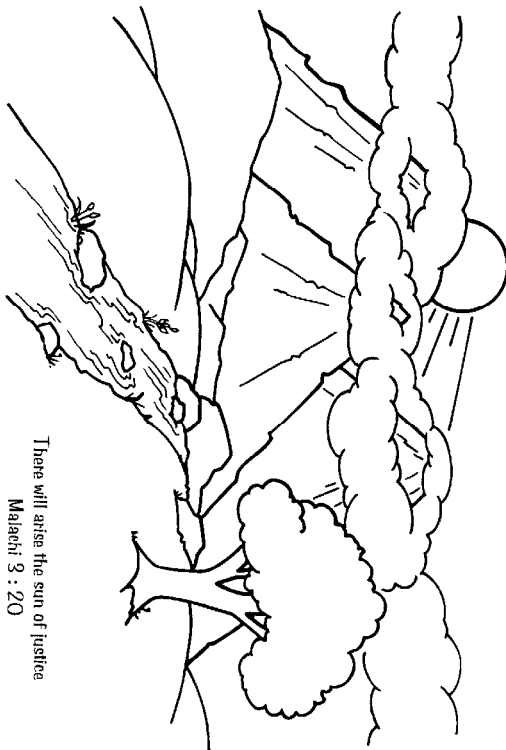


Keeping Your Faith In Jesus

- Give thanks before you eat any meal. This prayer can be said silently or outwardly.
- Before you sit down to do your homework, take the time to ask for guidance and give thanks for your talents (all that you are capable of doing).
- Keep prayer as part of your nighttime routine.

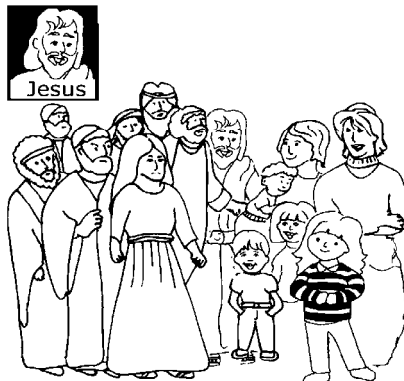

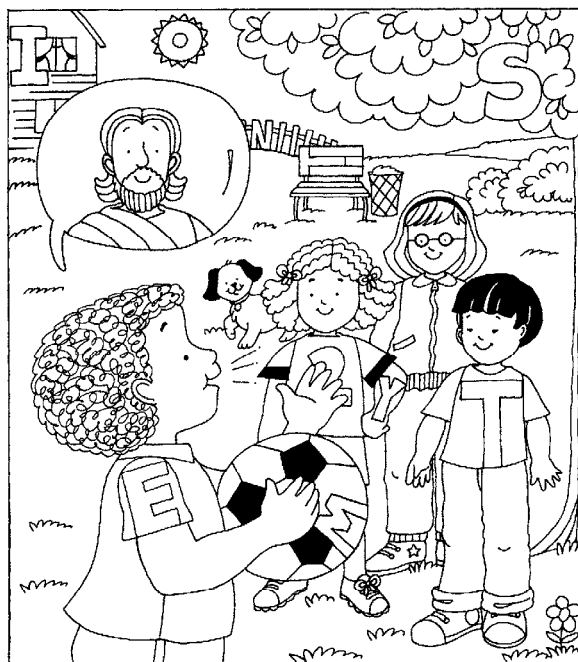
